

Treasurer's Report

Treasurer's Report to the Church – April 2014

Pledge income continues to run about 5% below what our budget calls for. By keeping expenses low, we are still showing a positive income of about \$600 at the end of February. Property tax bills will be paid at the end of March, which will change the situation significantly. We do not pay property tax on the church itself, but there are about \$700 in special assessments due that are not waived in spite of our non-profit status. The other bills are on the rental property.

By now you have seen the proposed budget for next year and the pledge drive is underway. This budget is a minimum for the operation of the church as it is today. There is no extra for growth and only the generosity of our members can provide what is needed beyond this budget to provide for improvement. As always, you can view the monthly details of our finances on the board in Jackson Hall.

She graduated from Woodrow Wilson High School and long Beach City College in the mid-sixties and also has taken classes at S. J. Delta Community College here.

There has been quite a varied work experience. Debora was born in Gulfport, MS, but moved to St. Clair Shores, MI at the age of one, where her mother and family were from, as well as her soon-to-be stepfather. They left Michigan when her stepfather was transferred to a new job with the telephone company in San Diego in 1963. Marriage to her now ex-husband in 1981 took her to Brooklyn, NY until this year, when she returned to her beloved California to start a new life.

Her early career was in commercial reinsurance. She returned to school to satisfy a creative need and one thing led to another, leading her to become a knitwear designer, graphic artist and teacher of design processes on the computer (commonly called CAD) for fashion and textile design, within the corporate arena and at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York City.

That is terrific, except that this job requires working on the weekends, so we won't be seeing her at services, much to her disappointment as well as ours. She does plan to stay in touch by joining some adult R.E. classes and participating where and when she can in other events.

Previously, her work took her all over the US and Canada, as well as France, the location of the home

office. She lived in Italy for a summer. She says there's too many places to list that she still wants to see, however, New Zealand and Guatemala would be at the top of that list. On her "bucket list" are sky diving, kayaking, and learning to watercolor.

In her youth, she did quite a bit of dirt-biking. She's met several celebrities, such as Carol Burnett, Brian Dennehy, Alex Grey and many fashion designers in NYC and during business travels.

Debora says she is a very spiritual person and has tried to find "answers" in many different flavors of Christianity and Buddism and felt that none of them really spoke to her soul and her mind. The theme for General Assembly 2014 is *Love Reaches Out*.

Religious life in America is changing dramatically and rapidly. Fewer people are identifying with specific denominations and most mainline religions are losing members in droves. People now find many outlets and places of engagement for their spiritual lives. Current studies of faith in America show that there is a movement toward a liberal, fluid kind of faith that doesn't fit with traditional denominational identity and structure. We already know that for every adult member of Unitarian Universalist (UU) congregations, there are at least three non-members who also consider themselves to be Unitarian Universalist.

A core purpose of our faith is to help people grow in spirit and in service. We believe that our faith provides a path for each of us to unlock our transformational capacity to serve the world with love. We want to expand our faith not just to grow Unitarian Universalism, but also to better achieve this transformational purpose.
