### Minister's Message

#### The ART of Interim Ministry



The cycle of life continues as we get ready to enter this month of transition-from winter to spring. Many of you have heard about the tragedy in our family; the 29 year old fiancé of my daughter, Elizabeth died suddenly. I went back

to San Antonio to be with her and to perform the Memorial Service.

The Sunday I returned and shared the news by lighting the sacred candles of joys and concerns. Then right after I went, Sarah Blessinger announced that her partner, Beth, had given birth to twin boys. I thought of the cycle of life, then, that one person dies and yet another two were born!

I am always struck at how religious relationships are, and our loved ones leaving us must be balanced by those loved ones around us giving us comfort. That we must all face the grief of losing a loved one, and the only way to survive is to live through the grief, express our feelings and cry our tears. We shouldn't tell people NOT to cry at these times, which we often do because we are uncomfortable with them crying; we should be telling them to cry as much as they need to, and we will be here supporting their grief.

Just as we don't miss the well until it runs dry, we must be intentional about living

every day and about developing loving relationships, which I believe is what religion is all about. Loving one another is often called the 11th Commandment, the new one brought by the teachings of Jesus. Church should be about how to do that religiously! How to be in covenant with one another. It's not easy because we have to give up some of our desires for the wider good of the community; we must also give up some of our money for the church, especially if it is to thrive for another 100 years?

My daughter's closest friend flew in from London to be with her; they had met and become friends at a youth (Young Religious UU's-YRUU) conference; her friend was from Oklahoma City, a long way from San Antonio, but they would see each other at various YRUU meetings throughout the South West District. They remain close more than 10 years later!

Let us remember how precious every day and every person is, especially when we find ourselves needing one another. Let us especially remember that when we disagree! Let us give up our usual need to be right and instead be loving, even willing to love people we think are wrong!

# NEWS FROM THE MINISTERIAL SEARCH COMMITTEE

The question most frequently asked by people who are not thoroughly acquainted with the UUA search process is: "Why can't we meet all the top candidates for Minister and hear them preach? Isn't it undemocratic for the search committee to present us with only one final candidate?"

The reason that serial candidating --- the process of presenting more than one candidate to the congregation --- is frowned upon is that it tends to be destructive to the candidates and to the congregations to which they are presented. Suppose one group likes and politics for Candidate A and another is for Candidate B. The congregation could be split asunder before the process has been completed and it is unlikely that any candidate would receive the vote of confidence needed for a successful ministry. From the point of view of the candidates, the confidentiality of the process would be broken and their effectiveness in their current congregation seriously impaired.

So, at the end of a long process of interviewing, evaluation, reference-checking, and consensus-building, your Search Committee will present you with the one candidate who is, in their opinion, best for our congregation. Then, after a full week of Sunday services, meetings, and social engagements, when you will be able to meet and size up the candidate for yourselves, you will make the final decision in the congregational vote to call or not to call.


